Congratulations to Luckey for finishing his Championship on Thanksgiving weekend, and to his owner, Denise. Cay won another point towards hers too. ©






<u>Charlie and the Christmas Kitty</u> by Ree Drummond, illustrated by Diane deGroat.

Who doesn't love the rhyming silliness of Dr. Seuss? This book also has tons of great information too! Great way to introduce kids to all breeds of dogs. All ages.




The Big New Yorker Book of Dogs by The New Yorker Magazine
