Diane will use your photo, or take one of her own if she so needs.








Book Reviews for the Younger Set

The One and Only Ivan by Katherine Applegate

This book not only won the Newbury Medal but also was on the NY Times bestseller list. The main character is a gorilla, but his best friend is a dog. This is a sweet, touching story about animals in an attraction. It tells how they became a family and eventually found a better life for themselves. For grades 4-8, but even adults will enjoy this.





Alaska's Dog Heroes: True Stories of Remarkable Canines by Shelley Gill

It's always good to introduce exciting and relatable non-fiction to young readers. These are true stories about amazing dogs from Alaska's history. Some will be familiar, like Balto, while others aren't lucky enough to have a statue in Central Park. They certainly are all fun to learn about! For grades 1-4.


<u>Charlie and the New Baby</u> by Ree Drummond, illustrated by Diane deGroat


This picture book comes out later this month.

There are a number of books in this series. They are sweet stories about a silly Basset Hound and his ranch, that the pre-k set will truly enjoy. What I love are the illustrations. While they have not won a Caldecott, they are bold, bright, and eye-catching. These books will be picked up and read many times. Also, new, is the Charlie "I Can Read" series. These are for level one emergent readers. If your child loved Charlie as a toddler, he will be eager to read about him when he starts school.

Notes from the Dog by Gary Paulsen.

Not a new book, but my favorite from Paulsen.
This is a coming of age book, where the dog plays a minor part. Two boys with their own struggles spend summer vacation learning what life is all about from a college student battling cancer.
Bittersweet, but worth the read. For grades 5-9.





Here's Hank, A Short Tale about a Long Dog by Henry Winkler and Lin Oliver

This book was written by the actor Henry Winkler and is the second book in the Hank series. They are semi-autobiographical accounts of Winkler's childhood. What makes them stand out is the fact that Winkler suffered through school with dyslexia and was not diagnosed until he was 31! These are simplistic stories for a struggling reader; even the font is weighted on the bottom to help prevent the flipping of letters. In this story, Hank, who struggles in school, works extra hard to get his grades up so he can adopt a dachshund from the pound. Grades 1-3.
