
This month Channel, from the Island Litter and Vice, from the Bad Kids Litter celebrate their ninth and second birthdays. Happy birthday to them and all their littermates!

Know the Signs of Hypothermia

Hypothermia is when your dog's core temperature drops below their average range. For dogs, it's 99 degrees or lower. Your dog can become hypothermic if they are left out in the cold too long or have been swimming in cold water too long. Dogs can also become hypothermic during surgery. Senior dogs, dogs with health issues, and shortcoated dogs are more susceptible. Puppies are also at risk because their system is too young to regulate. Besides taking their temp, there are other tell-tale signs. If your dog is whining, shivering, showing signs of stiffness or clumsiness, has pale gums, or has labored breathing, your dog is too cold and needs care immediately. If your dog is wet, dry them carefully and thoroughly. Then warm them with blankets near a heat source. You can use hot water bottles if they are on top of the blankets and not on your dog's skin. Never use a heating pad or hair dryer, too hot too fast is not good. Dogs usually can recover from mild to moderate hypothermic episodes at home, but if they become unconscious, emergency vet care is necessary. Your vet will use warm IV fluids that target organs to warm them up. As always, if you are concerned, err on the side of caution, and take your dog to their vet. Hypothermia can be deadly.
